
Alcohol Exposed Pregnancies


- ◆ In 2023, 8.4% of pregnant people between the ages of 15-44 years old reported using alcohol in the past month
 - ◆ 4.8% report binge alcohol use in the past month

- Fetal alcohol spectrum disorders (FASD) are a common cause of neurodevelopmental delay
 - ◆ Estimates range from 1-5% of U.S. children in the first grade

◆2021 – 2023: women 18 - 25 yo had higher rates of binge drinking than men (31.6 vs. 29.9)



Differences in Consequences of Alcohol Use and Access to Treatment

- Increases in alcohol-related consequences larger for women
 - ED visits, hospitalizations, deaths
- Women with alcohol use disorder (AUD), compared to men with AUD:
 - More likely to develop alcohol-associated cardiovascular disease
 - More likely to develop liver cirrhosis
- Women report more barriers to treatment entry
 - Stigma and shame
 - Transportation
 - Childcare
